Dear Friends,

write these words on February 7th, after two weeks of protests in Egypt. By the time you read my reflections, much will have surely changed on ground. Nonetheless, as we move toward Passover, we have added reason to think about that soil from which our people emerged and our identification with the quest for freedom.

Our Passover narrative describes deliverance from living under the thumb of an unjust Pharaoh enabling freedom and the responsibility of self-government. What could be a more seductive cause than support for the protestors in Egypt? But there is a catch: our own self-interest.

For 31 years, President Mubarak has provided security on Israel's Southern border. Egypt and Israel's friendship is admittedly arms-length and more disturbingly, it has hardly changed the negative portrayal of Israel in the Egyptian news media and mosques. We Jews are understandably nervous about who will rule Israel's mighty neighbor, which is 48 times larger than Israel and with 10 times its population. Yet, that fear should not cloud our sympathy for those who seek democratic rule.

On Saturday as protestors gathered in Cairo's Tahrir Square in the face of violent pro-Mubarak supporters, Jews around the world traditionally read the words of Isaiah (chapter 60) condemning hypocrisy. Across 2600 years, the prophet spoke on behalf of the Almighty saying, God will mock those who bring offerings

while engaging in injustice. We are called- both as Jews and as Americans- to identify with and aid those who pursue justice.

In our own nation, President Bush emphasized in his Second Inaugural Address the foundational human longing for freedom and our nation's calling to lend our support. Those words were influenced by Israeli leader and former Soviet dissident Natan Sharansky who in his book, The Case for Democracy: The Power of Freedom to Overcome Tyranny and Terror, asserted that increased democratic rule will enhance security and peace in our world. When President Obama spoke in Cairo in 2009 he likewise encouraged Arab leaders to provide their people with more transparent government and the freedom to choose how they live.

We have good reasons to fear the well-organized Muslim Brotherhood as a religious organization founded on a quest for Islamic law to serve as the supreme law of the land. Commentators commonly estimate that 20% of Egyptians, approximately twice the size of Israel's total population, identify with this rigidly traditionalist Islamic group, whose leadership has a consistent record of anti-Israel and anti-semitic rhetoric. Egypt's revolution will hopefully not unfold as Iran's or Gaza's election. National aspirations and political cultures differ. Egypt has a long and noble history. It was the first major Arab nation to make peace with Israel. May it be the first to truly gain unified leadership through fair and open elections.

Jews have a long history of living with hope despite uncertainty. Indeed, Israel's national anthem, the hatikvah, means "the hope." Our hope of a better world emerges from abiding by foundational values, which includes the dignity of each person. In watching and listening to those in Egypt voice their yearning for a responsive and responsible government, I hear the words of God and Judaism calling on me to pray for the protestor's safety and a tomorrow of greater freedom.

Post script: On February 11th Mubarek made his exit, pushed out by the military leaders who responded to the passion and persistence of large crowds of protestors. Poetically, February 11th corresponds to the date in 1986 that Natan Sharansky walked out of a Soviet Concentration camp and Nelson Mandela in 1990 left jail after twenty-six years of incarceration. Both of these men exemplify the possibilities of using freedom for the betterment of others. The day after the day of a revolution is a time of uncertainty. It is too early to know if Egypt's government will unfold toward an open society with free elections and a free press or toward another form of military control. If it unfolds toward democracy, there is the hope of sustained, positive relations with Israel. At our seder tables let us consider including a discussion on the growing wave of freedom seeking around our world. Among the questions: how has technology made a difference in enabling both the desire for free expression and the ability to organize? How can the internet be a tool for either good or evil? What are our hopes and fears as we look forward toward change in the Middle East and around the world? I wish each of you a Pesach of joy in celebration of our own freedoms.

A RARE OPPORTUNITY TO GRIEVE IN COMMUNITY, THEN AND NOW

hapter three of Babyonian arphi Talmud Tractate *Moed Katan* (literally "less significant holidays") addresses the challenges posed for a mourner when their shiva and/ or sheloshim coincide with one of the shalosh regalim (Pesah, Shavuot and Sukkot) and specifically the intermediate days of Pesah and Sukkot known as hol hamoed. As with most Talmudic discussions, it begins with a topic that is relevant to the heading of the tractate and then wanders around the vast terrain of all questions that could emerge with respect to mourning practices in general. In the center of page 22b, the conversation focuses on Kriya – tearing one's garment upon learning that a family member has died. How quickly after shiva can the tear be mended? Where does one tear - at the collar or in the middle of the garment? When one is wearing layered clothing - do they just tear the outer garment or all layers? Where does one tear - publicly or in private?

We learn towards the bottom of that page from Rabbi Hiyyah bar Abba in the name of Rabbi Yohanan: "On all the relatives [other than one's parents] tearing your underlayers of clothing is sufficient, but for one's parents one must tear the outer garment [thereby insuring a public display of one's great grief]". Rav Hisda adds, "And so too with the Nasi (the chief Rabbi of a big city or collection of cities) [the entire

community tears their outer garment as if for a parent]. A few lines later, we learn: "The Rabbis taught - a Hakham who dies, his bet midrash is closed [during the week of shiva]. An Av bet din who dies, all the batei midrash throughout his city are closed and everyone gathers in the synagogue and no one sits in their regular places (a sign that one is in mourning). A Nasi who dies, all the batei midrash throughout his entire jurisdiction are closed and the members of the K'nesset (the community leaders/ governmental officials) gather in the synagogue and read from the Torah for seven days and leave [to pray on their own in their own homes, because they too are in mourning].

We assume that the Hakham, the Av Bet Din and the Nasi represent the hierarchy of rabbinic authority and influence. One could liken a rabbi of a single synagogue to the Hakham. The Av Bet Din might be a communal figure that has inspired many rabbis and lay people in a larger area (like Los Angeles), the authorative leader of a rabbinic council, or a leading scholar at a seminary whose teachings inspire a generation of devoted students who then go out to lead many communities. Nasi, however, is larger than life - a person whose inspirational teachings extend beyond the boarders of an organization or movement. American Jews today live such varied life-styles, it is hard to imagine a religious figure whose Torah could have wide reaching impact. Prior to and throughout the Middle Ages there might have been one Nasi in a generation if that. Today, especially in the West, a true rarity.

When my beloved friend and colleague, Deborah Togut, died just a year ago, her entire community came out to mourn their great loss. More than a thousand people attended her funeral. Two police cars were required to escort everyone to the cemetery and, while the synagogue could not totally close for business, a pall was cast over the entire congregation. Deborah was for them a *Hakham*. Two months ago, with the passing of Debbie Friedman, we witnessed how the non-Orthodox Jewish world

responded to the loss of a Nasi. It was remarkable. In the late 1960s Debbie cracked open a door of religious expression that millions of Jewish men and woman have flooded through over the last 40 years. What began as a trickle of young people in the Reform summer-camping movement turned into a tidal wave in less than 25 years and the course of Jewish musical and liturgical expression is forever changed. Debbie's obituary was in newspapers around the world. Aside from the more than 1000 people at her funeral that was attended by over 60 Reform and Conservative rabbis and cantors (the B'nai haknesset, if you will), more than 7000 people were in attendance via the internet. Every synagogue I know paid tribute to her legacy on the Shabbat during her Shiva and many did special programs to mark her sheloshim. Even those who did not know Debbie's music, appreciated her prophetic vision. I received condolence messages from my interfaith colleagues.

Sometime when we study what can appear to be the minutia of rabbinic dialectic, it feels outdated and irrelevant. While there are no words to express the profound sadness that I feel over the loss of my beloved Deborah (Hehazzan Shoshana Devorah bat Avraham haKohenv'Miriam) at the age of 46 and over Debbie's (Dina Leah bat Freidl v'Gavrielle) sudden passing which shocked the Jewish world, I am humbled by the eternal wisdom of our tradition. While our great sages, zichroman livrakhah could never have imagined that their prescriptions for mourning would apply to female religious leaders, I like to imagine that would be comforted to know that their torah lives on in the 21st century. ♥

Our family has received so much from CBI, and I feel honored to be able to serve as president and give something in return.

CELEBRATING JEWISH TIME

∕braham Joshua Heschel, 🖊 Rabbi, Philosopher and Social Activist in the mid-20th century, explored the concept of time. He points out that the Bible is more concerned with time than with space, emphasizing generations and events more than objects or lands. He said the Bible speaks the language of history rather than geography. This was a departure from other religious systems prevalent in the ancient Near East which had gods associated with places or trees or rivers, etc. In fact, Heschel asserts: "Judaism can be characterized as a religion 'aiming at the sanctification of time.'" For example, the first time the word "Kodesh" or "holy" is used in the Bible, it refers to an event in time, that is, Shabbat: "God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy."

At Mercaz Limmud, we regard celebrating Jewish time as an important part of our mission, for celebrating time is one of the unique and special features of being Jewish. In fact, I strongly urge our teachers not to teach the Jewish holidays by means of a textbook or a worksheet. The Jewish holidays were meant to be celebrated and experienced, not to be read as an anthropological study or colored in as if one were painting by numbers. That is why our holiday celebrations at Mercaz Limmud are referred to as "Havayot," or "Holiday Experiences." As our students prepare for

the upcoming holidays of Purim and Pesach, we are planning exceptional Havayot that are meaningful, memorable and engaging for our students. Our rabbis taught, "Hazman Katzar VeHa'Avodah Merubeh," "the time is short and the task is great." At Mercaz Limmud, our approach is two-fold: (1) focus our class room training on Hebrew and prayer skills so that our students will be well prepared with synagogue and Jewish life skills for Bar/Bat Mitzvah and beyond and (2) provide our students with meaningful and enriching learning experiences in order to make Judaism come alive in an exciting and important way. In doing so, we will be true to our tradition of sanctifying time and making it meaningful and holy.

Just a note to let you know what's been going on in *Mercaz Hadracha* (Hebrew High):

We've had several engaging speakers: Rabbi Spitz on "How to give advice without getting shot: the Jethro story,"; Dr. Jacob Weisberg, a nationally recognized communications consultant conducted interactive sessions on active listening; Rabbinic intern Adam Greenwald spoke about Tu b'Shevat as an environmental holiday, and Johanna Rose addressed seniors on AIPAC and advocacy for Israel. We also welcomed Mina Rush for Jewish World Watch to speak on the genocides in Darfu and Congo. This has been an enriching and inspiring time for our teenagers!

Our 8th and 9th grade students composed a beautiful mosaic with renowned mosaic artist Irina Charney that was presented to our synagogue on February 23. This wonderful, expressive project was funded by the Zembrosky Art Fund.

II CBI members have the opportunity to register during the month of March. As many of you know, the Preschool is a highly acclaimed school, rich in Jewish tradition, with a very low teacher ratio, and beautiful indoor and outdoor environments. There are five classes:

The Dagim Class, (Babies), Shfanim, (Toddlers), Girafot, (Young Preschool), Pilim, (Preschool) and the oldest, Parparim, (PreK).

The school offers full time, part time, half and full days. Homemade kosher lunches are available along with healthy snacks (some even grown in our own organic gardens). The children make and take home their own challah every Shabbat.

They have Pediatric CPR and First Aid training, are finger printed by the National registrar, and many have advanced degrees and years of experience. More than half of our staff have been here for at least six years.

believe that care and learning are inseparable and that each child is a thinking and creative individual.



It's all about Ritual

very year on the fourteenth \mathcal{O} of Adar, Jewish communities around the world gather to celebrate Purim, a joyous festival commemorating the deliverance of the Jews from potential annihilation as related in the Book of Esther. Although God is conspicuously absent from the Book of Esther, His "absence" is counterbalanced by the story's fascinating and memorable characters, such as Haman, the evil grand vizier of Persia and a descendant of the anti-Semitic Amalekites; Queen Esther, the Jewish heroine whose brave intervention saves the Jews from destruction: and Mordechai, Esther's uncle and a great religious leader of his generation. Although King Ahasuerus is clearly the most powerful figure in this tense drama, his persona is eclipsed by the exploits of Esther and Mordechai and the grogger-induced mayhem associated with Haman. What else is there to know about Ahasuerus?

According to the Book of Esther, Ahasuerus (*Achashverosh* in Hebrew) was the ruler of the Kingdom of Persia, which stretched from India (Hodu) to Ethiopia (Cush) and was composed of 127 provinces. The Hebrew name Achashverosh is derived from the Persian name Khashayarsha. It is commonly believed that Ahasuerus was Xerxes I, aka Xerxes the Great, who ruled over the Persian Empire from 486 to 465 B.C.E. This is the same Xerxes who invaded Greece and fought a small coalition of Greek forces led by the Spartans at the battle of Thermopylae in 480 B.C.E. This military expedition ultimately failed and Xerxes retired to Persia. The events described in the Purim story are believed to have taken place following his return to Persia.

Our tradition teaches us that much of Ahasuerus' tremendous wealth was derived from King Nebuchadnezzar's spoils of conquest, which occurred many years before. Nebuchadnezzar looted the treasures of the Beit

HaMikdash and placed them in a ship that he sank in the Euphrates River for safekeeping. Eventually the Babylonian Empire was succeeded by the Persian Empire and the treasures of the Beit HaMikdash came into the possession of Ahasuerus. As described in first chapter of the Book of Esther, Ahasuerus threw two sumptuous parties (the first lasting 180 days and the second seven days) in the city of Shushan during which he displayed, and therefore desecrated, the holy vessels and robes of the Beit HaMikdash. Moreover, according to the Talmud, the Jews of Shushan participated in Ahasuerus' lavish seven-day celebration, and it was this sin that served as the catalyst for the near destruction of the Jews described in the Purim story.

Fortunately the story of Purim has a happy ending: the Jews are saved, Haman and his sons are hanged, and Mordechai becomes Ahasuerus' second-in-command. The Sages also teach us that the son of Ahasuerus and Esther, Darius II, eventually took over as ruler and allowed the Jews to begin rebuilding the *Beit HaMikdash* in Jerusalem, so in an interesting turn of events Ahasuerus' legacy ultimately benefits the Jewish people.

From a ritual perspective, it is worth noting that in contrast to Chanukah and Pesach, Jews do not recite *Hallel* on Purim. The reason for this omission is that following the deliverance of the Jews in Purim, they still remained subjects of Ahasuerus; therefore, their salvation was deemed to be "incomplete." \proptop



We honor Esther on this day, who fasted before she appeared before the king to tell him about Haman, thus risking her life and ultimately saving the Jews.

n January 30, 2011 a lively and inspiring Women's League Torah Fund Study Day was held at Sinai Temple in Los Angeles. Passover Preparations (summarized)*

A Guide Prepared by the Rabbinical Assembly

The Torah prohibits the ownership of *hametz* (leaven) during Pesach. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the *hametz* to a non-Jew. The transfer, *mekhirat hametz*, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. (See form on reverse of this page.) At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now permitted *hametz* if ownership of the *hametz* was not transferred before the holiday. The use of this *hametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well (*Hametz sheavar alav hapesah*).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of *hametz* during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of *hametz*, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, *hametz* cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of *hametz* renders the whole item *hametz* and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, *hametz* follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e., it loses its identity in a mixture of one part *hametz* and sixty parts of *non-hametz* (*batel beshishim*). This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.

What follows is a general guideline. However, Rabbi Spitz should be consulted when any doubt arises. Kosher laPesach labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting the Rabbi.

Prohibited Foods

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffee with cereal derivatives in them, wheat barley, oats, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans, peas, peanuts; however, string beans are permitted). Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than its natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil, peanut oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult Rabbi Spitz for guidance in the use of these products.

Permitted Foods

- A. The following foods require no kosher lePesach label if purchased prior to Pesach. Unopened packages or containers of natural coffee (without cereal additives), sugar, pure tea, salt, pepper, natural spices, fruit juices with no additives (frozen, canned, or bottled), frozen (uncooked) vegetables, milk, butter, cottage cheese, cream cheese, tuna in water (no oil added), frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives), baking soda.
- B. The following foods require no kosher lePesach label if purchased before or during Pesach. Fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.




