June 9, 2013: Sharansky for President of Israel

write in the afterglow of last Sunday's public conversation with Natan Sharansky. I had sought a public conversation with Sharansky for many years and had read each of his three books soon after they were released. I pause to thank Barbara and Joe Baim and the Jewish Agency for enabling the interview. What I could not have anticipated was how warm and unpretentious I found Natan and Avital. his wife. Their ease and humor stood in sharp contrast to the mighty challenges that they each faced and the impact that they made on both the Jewish community and the world at large.

Last week, Avital was honored in NYC by the American Jewish Historical Society, which maintains a large archive on the Soviet Jewry Movement. In 1974, Avital received permission to leave Moscow to immigrate to Israel. The night before she boarded the plane, she and Natan wed in a synagogue. The Soviet authorities refused Natan a visa, because they said that as a computer scientist he had obtained State information. A couple of years later, Natan was arrested and convicted to twelve years of brutal labor as an American spy. Avital campaigned all over the world for her husband's release from the Siberian prison. She met with then President Reagan and implored him to help. When

Reagan met with Gorbachev for the first time, he said, "Sharansky is not a spy and you will only have the trust of the American people when you let him go." And Gorbachev listened. Sharansky was the first political prisoner freed by Gorbachev, which was done as part of a spy exchange. During the twelve years apart, Avital was persistent and fearless. She helped make her husband the symbol of the Soviet Jewry movement. Once Natan was freed in 1986, Avital ceased to speak out in rallies. She turned over those duties to her husband.

After the couple reunited, Natan got busy, aware that there were hundreds of thousands of Soviet Jews who could not yet leave. In 1987, he and Avital and their young daughter came to the States and visited thirty cities, calling on Jews to participate in a massive rally on the mall of Washington, DC, to correspond with President Mikhail Gorbachev's first visit to the States. Many Jewish leaders said that such a rally would embarrass President Reagan and undermine his budding relationship with the Soviet leader. Natan and Avital asked for a meeting with President Reagan to thank him for his efforts. Reagan greeted them with great warmth. Sharansky told how he began cautiously describing the rally that he hoped to bring to Washington. The US President cut him off before he got far into his presentation and said, "You have to do what you have to do and I will do what I have to do. As long as there are Jews unable to leave, you must do all that you can to help them." In December of 1987, over a quarter million protestors gathered on the Mall, the largest collection of people since the Civil Rights Movement. In his diary, Reagan wrote that he pointed to the protestors and said to Gorbachev, "As long as your people are not free to leave, our relationship and the image of your nation are tarnished." The gates of the Former Soviet Union opened. Close to 1.8 million Jews emigrated and the Soviet Union as a Communist State

collapsed.

Natan had faced the KGB and maintained his integrity. He teases that he served in the Gulag for nine years and for nine years in the Knesset. He says that in prison he felt free to maintain a clear understanding of right and wrong. Politics, he said, was hard because it is the art of compromise. He says that most days as a politician he wondered if he should quit. In fact, he resigned twice. When Prime Minister Netanyahu asked him to join his government five years ago, he declined and instead asked to head the Jewish Agency, the organization most responsible for Israel's relationship with the Diaspora. As an immigrant to Israel, he felt a bond with Jews around the world and saw strengthening Jewish identity as an immediate need.

Natan helps unite the Jewish people. He would say that the Jewish people are an extended family with a purpose and that purpose includes helping all people gain their freedom. In his twenties, he was not only the spokesman for the Jewish refuseniks, but also for the Helsinki Watch. This latter group was organized by renowned physicist, Andre Sakharov, and sought to document Soviet violations of its international agreement to honor human rights. Sharansky's arrest was precisely for his work on behalf of Helsinki Watch. Today Natan Sharansky reaches out broadly to all Jews and makes me feel proud to be a Jew. When Avital received her recent award, the prominent activist Rabbi Avi Weiss said "The Jewish leader who made the biggest impact during the second half of the 20th century was Avital Sharansky." She indeed is a selfless hero. And yet, her achievements are intertwined with those of her husband. Natan will continue to shape the future of our people and make an impact for good on the larger world.





REINVENTING IDENTITY

Ow are we going to save ℓ the Jewish people from disappearing off the face of the earth? This is the meta-question asked by Jewish leaders in every generation from the moment Joshua led the Israelites into Canaan to conquer it. God suspected that we were going to get along really well with the Jebusites, Perizites, Hittites, and Amorites, dig their ladies and check out their gods and He was right - Gevult! In the wake of the destruction of the Second Temple, things changed. Rabbinic leaders set in motion practices that enabled diaspora Judaism to flourish. That, combined with our "otherness" wherever we lived, insured that for nearly 1700 years, Jewish children born to Jewish parents were going to stay Jewish whether they wanted to or not. And. despite bouts of horrific persecution that took hundreds of thousands of Jewish lives throughout the Middle Ages, we flourished, both in sheer number and culturally. The French Revolution was a game changer. In enlightened communities we could finally leave the ghetto and be like everybody else. And we did, in droves.

Fast forward past WWII to a Europe without Jews. The few of us left who live in America have

nothing holding us close to our brilliant, deep and ancient heritage - not even culturally, because there is no Vilna to return to, even for a social visit with distant cousins who were never born because their would-be grandparents were annihilated. The best way to inspire an entire generation of young adults with Jewish lineage to imagine a Jewish future is a connection to Israel. Thank God for Birthright! just returned from leading a trip of deaf and hearing college students and recent graduates. It was, as they say in Hebrew, mamash really something! To watch these young Jewish adults (especially the deaf men and women) be moved to identify as Jews for the first time in their lives was indescribable. Since 1999, over 400,000 college and post-college students from all over the world have been given the gift of Israel, and what a gift it is.

Of the thirty-seven participants on my trip, only twelve had two Jewish parents. Hello Jebusites! Many had rarely if ever been to synagogue, less than half had a bar or bat mitzvah, and even fewer would have ever considered spending time in Israel had this all-expense paid trip not been possible. Birthright is to the 21st century what J-Date was to the 1990s. Clergy from all movements marvel at the high percentage of couples we marry that meet over the Internet - on J-date, Frumster (love that name), and the like. Because so many birthright participants are eager to return to Israel for a longer time, birthright created Masa – an organization that helps Jewish adults, ages 21-30, access and afford the variety of learning and volunteer opportunities in Israel for college graduates. The same philanthropists who support birthright also underwrite a meaningful percentage of the cost of these extended programs. A recent followup study of birthright participants has found that they are marrying, on average, two-years later than their Jewish contemporaries who did not attend birthright because they are waiting to find a Jewish partner or because they have a significant other who is in the process of conver-

the privilege had attending the four-day United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism's Sulam Conference for Synagogue Presidents in May. Sulam (Hebrew for "ladder") is a program run annually by the USCJ with the objective of offering insight, enlightenment and spiritual motivation to lay leadership.

I was with 14 other presidents and soon-to-be presidents, as well as 6 members of the United Synagogue leadership development staff. We participated together in workshops, presentations and t'fillah throughout the day, and had a chance to get to know one another socially during meals and at the evening events. It was clear that virtually all of the synagogues represented at Sulam face the same challenges as we do. Not surprisingly, there was a strong focus on financial sustainability, membership growth and retention, providing meaningful Jewish experiences to our congregants, and the balance between lay and clerical leadership. Presentations were delivered on these and other topics, and best practices were shared freely among the participants.

My fellow presidents were all warm and enthusiastic, and fully committed to their respective congregations. We all share a desire to lead with a strong set of tools and have already begun building a support network. I am hopeful that the Sulam experience will help me be a better CBI President, and look forward to applying what I learned

Did You Know That Block Play is More Than Just Playing?

t most definitely is!
This promotes science, math & literacy learning. Block-building provides a natural context for development of early math concepts, such as number, quantity, measuring, symmetry and pattern as well as comparisons such as more or less. In fact, research shows that early block play is related to later math competence.

The teachers at the preschool facilitate learning by offering the infants, toddlers, and preschoolers opportunities and materials to promote their construction of mathematical thinking.

If you wandered into the block center in the PreK class you will see an area filled with various sizes and shapes of blocks, yardsticks, tape measures, levels, blueprints, play people, animals, natural tree pieces, a building platform, large plants, mirrors, Mylar, ramps, wheels, and a lot of recyclable items (loose parts). In addition there are clipboards with paper and pencils, as well as books about bridges, building, castles, and pyramids. Picture a child with a measuring tape or yardstick, clipboard and pencil in his/her hand, analyzing the block structure their friends are creating. All of a sudden the building collapses. A discussion (language) ensues about how they will keep the structure from falling (gravity) when

they recreate it. One theory (idea) is to put up supports along the sides during this process and another suggestion is to place a larger foundation on the floor as they begin. One of the children draws their ideas and the process begins again. When they have finished and the building stands tall, the children document their success by drawing & labeling the finished project.

Children in our Prek class, who experienced a year's worth of this type of block play, have excelled in math, science and literacy as they've moved into elementary school.

sion. That's a wow.

The members of my group had the opportunity, along with about 200 other students who were in Jerusalem at the same time, to hear birthright founder and former Hillel director, Avraham Infeld, speak. He drove home the point that JUDAISM IS NOT A RELIGION. It is an extended family with a shared history, homeland and set of values. That may sound strange to you and me, but it is not a lie and a truth that needs better press in American diaspora communities. Emphasis that a belief in God and commitment to ritual practice are not essential for Jewish identification is a bold reframing of Jewish identity that is speaking to this generation of "millenials" who may already have two feet out the door. Watching this group cling to Infeld's every word was a sight to behold. He was affirming that they need not feel disconnected from the Jewish people just because they do not feel at home in the synagogue or have no connection to prayer. At our group wrap-up session, each student was asked to reflect on how this experience had impacted him or her. More than half the group mentioned Infeld's powerful talk, but, even without that, meeting Israeli soldiers and falling in love with the land speaks for itself.

I have no idea how many more years birthright will continue, but, please, spread the word to all Jewish and interfaith couples you know with children 18-26. This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that, like Israel's miraculous existence, should not be taken for granted.




