Our Conversation with Professor Richard Hovannisian

n Sunday night, August 18th, members of the Jewish and Armenian community shared a kosher Armenian dinner mentored by Zov Karardian, a child of survivors of the Armenian Genocide and much admired proprietor of Zov's Bistro. Afterwards, we enjoyed a public conversation with Professor Richard Hovannisian, a founding scholar of Armenian studies. Professor Hovannisian taught at UCLA, published extensively on Armenian history, and with his students interviewed close to eight hundred survivors of the Genocide of 1915-1918. He did so when there were still those alive to recount what they saw.

As a Jew and a child of survivors of the Holocaust of World War II, listening to Professor Hovannisian gave me a wider context for my people's own tragedy. I learned that the nationalist Young Turks in an emerging new nation of Turkey saw the collapse of the once mighty Ottoman Empire as a national affront. Christian countries, such as Russia, were taking land away. In crafting the new Turkey, there was a desire to consolidate identity. Christians, Greek and Armenian, were seen as a potential subversives and as lacking a commonality with the Islamic. Turkish majority. Under cover of World War I, the Turks were able in an organized, centralized fashion to direct the deaths of close to 60 % of the more than two million Armenians who had lived in Turkey. Men were shot and most women and children died on brutal marches for relocation to the desert.

Hovannisian Professor described a parallel with World War II and the Germans. Forced to pay enormous penalties marking the end of World War I and beset by a world economic crisis, German nationalism and scapegoating grew. The Nazis sought to purify Germany of the foreigners, the Jews, as potentially disloyal and different in race and faith than the Aryan. Under cover of War the Third Reich was able to engage in mass extermination of the Jews.

A key difference between the Jewish and Armenian communities is the aftermath of our respective genocides. The Armenian Genocide meant that Armenians lost their historic homeland and were left to define themselves for the first time as primarily a Diaspora community. The Turkish government made it a crime to claim that the Turks perpetrated mass killings of the Armenians. Instead, the official line was that there were Armenian provocations and a kind of civil war during World War I. Turkey used much leverage against governments who were willing to recognize the Armenian Genocide. For instance, in 1982 there was the first international gathering on genocide, organized by institutions in Israel and to be held in Tel Aviv. Several hundred scholars from around the world were scheduled to participate. In anticipation of the event, an Israeli newspaper article noted that several scholars would address the Armenian Genocide. Turkish government leaders contacted their counterparts in Israel and said that if the Armenians participated, Turkey would close its borders to Iran during a time in which many Iranian Jews were fleeing toward freedom. Elie Wiesel, chair of the event, withdrew. He said that he could not deny the Armenian Genocide and would not want to jeopardize Jewish lives. The official Israeli sponsors withdrew their names from the conference, which still took place with the Armenian scholars participating, including Professor Hovannisian. Until now, both the United States and Israel have failed to officially acknowledge the Armenian genocide.

Jews have had a long history of Diaspora and the events of World War II were part of a larger identify of suffering and dispersion. Germany acknowledged responsibility and reparations were paid. In fact, in the aftermath of the Holocaust, Jews regained a national land in the State of Israel. a product in part of international guilt for not having done more to prevent the horrific crimes. And Jews have memorialized their story through film, museums, and ritual events. Indeed, those museums have become places of learning the dangers of hate speech, political tyranny, and government sponsored crime.

I asked Professor Hovannisian, "How can we as wounded peoples heal?" Professor Hovannisian responded, "We need to make our particular stories universal, so that they will be meaningful to others, and we need to respond to suffering in the world." As a Jew, I am much identified with his guidance for our people's healing. \$\Price\$

LET FREEDOM RING!

∕ugust 28, 2013 marked the 50th anniversary of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Communities all over America gathered to pay tribute to the achievements of the past five decades and share hopes for the future. I had the opportunity to represent the Orange County Jewish community at the Rally and March held at Sasscer Park in Santa Ana on September 1. Below are the words I shared:

B'ruchim haba'im - Blessings upon all of us who have chosen to be present at this sacred occasion marking the anniversary of an event that changed the course of human history. I dedicate this invocation to the honor and memory of all the women and men who, fifty years ago, embraced the civil rights movement as if it was their own because they understood at their very core that any human suffering and indignation is an affront to all peoplehood; to all those who knew then and now that an America divided by race is anything but states united: and to those who are mindful of all work that lies ahead.

This coming week your Jewish brothers and sisters will embark on a powerful ten-day journey. Wednesday night is the start of Rosh

Hashanah - the Jewish New Year. We will come together in community to stand trial before God, the ultimate judge, who waits and wants us to search our souls, scrutinize our actions, analyze our relationships and ask for forgiveness for all our failings. As we stand shoulder to shoulder ten days later on Yom Kippur, our sacred day of atonement, we will beat our breasts as we chant "We have sinned against You through hardening our hearts, and we have sinned against You by resorting to violence. We have sinned against You by greed and oppressive interest, and we have sinned against You through selfishness. We have sinned against you by apathy and we have sinned against you through arrogance." If but one of us turns a blind eve to injustice and inequity of any kind, we are all at fault. Embedded in our tradition is the notion that, just as You, God, are One, so too, the whole of humanity - Your masterpiece of creation precisely because You endowed us with the capacity to seek and understand your will - is nothing if we cannot acknowledge that every person on this earth is created lovingly, in Your Image, worthy of a life of wholeness and fulfillment.

Were he alive today, Reverend King would surely be inspired by what he would witness at events like this all over America: Brothers and sisters -Black, White, Latino, Asian, Christian, Muslim, Hindu, Jewish, Buddhist, gay, straight, young and old - gathered together to rededicate ourselves to working for the cause of equality and freedom for all Americans. Great strides have been made, but not nearly enough. Fifty years later, we are still on our way, arm in arm, stepby-step, day-by-day, year-by-year, court battle by court battle. A wise first century rabbinic sage, Rabbi Tarfon, who lived during the time of the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem taught us this: "The day is short, the task is great, the reward bountiful, and the Master insistent! You are not obliged to finish the task, but neither are you free to neglect it." We cannot stop until our work is done.

How to Help Your Child be Successful in Religious School

Hint: It has nothing to do with reading Hebrew!

Hillel says, "Do not separate yourself from the community." (Mishneh Avot 2:5)

e bring our children to religious school not only to learn about our history and heritage, but also so that they will have a relationship with other Jewish children. Surveys show that Jewish children who have Jewish friends, in religious school, camp, and USY, are more likely to want to continue their Jewish identification and activities into their young adult years. It is also true that if a child has friends in his/ her Sunday school class, they will look forward to going and participating with them. Consequently, their Hebrew reading will be better, their general knowledge and level of participation will be higher, and their desire to continue learning beyond the Bar/Bat Mitzvah is greater.

Our religious school teachers recognize that their classrooms are special communities and they help the children make friends, get along, and be part of the group. They learn together, pray together, and play together.

How can you help? You can make arrangements with other parents for

your children to spend time together. How about having lunch together after Sunday school or dinner together on a Wednesday evening? You can arrange to spend Shabbat together. Children will come to Jr. Congregation if they come with a friend. Play time on Sunday afternoons is great fun and you can have dinner together with your families.

Reaching out to make new friends is important for children – and for adults! Please spend some time getting to know the other families in your class and facilitating social time for your children. Ultimately everyone will feel more connected and involved. And the children will look forward to coming to religious school! \$\Phi\$

The Tenth of Tevet

Friday, December 13 • 7:30 – 9:00 AM • in the Bet Midrash

Why Does Friday make this observance even more interesting? **Come and See!**

The Tenth of the Hebrew month of Tevet is a Minor Fast Day (daylight only). It is chronologically the first day that commemorates the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem. On this date in 587 BCE, the Babylonian King Nebuchadnezzar began the siege of Jerusalem, which led to the destruction of the First Temple 18 months later. A modern observance has become part of the Service for this day. In Israel, the Tenth of Tevet has been designated as Yom Hakaddish Haklali, the Day of the General Kaddish, when we all rise to mourn those who have died in defense of Israel, and to remember those whose time of death is unknown. he Youth Department has just completed an amazing summer. Camp Bnai Ruach 2013 was all we dreamed it could be. 




