learned a new word today, "febrile." It was in a headline describing the financial markets. Febrile means feverish: a description of the wide swings in the Dow. As we move toward High Holydays, our economy is unsteady and some of our congregants are challenged with job searches. Know that our synagogue is committed to never letting finances be a barrier to synagogue belonging. I tell prospective congregants who are in need of special consideration in meeting membership dues that there is a time to accept support and G-d willing a time later to offer that support for others. Among our High Holyday prayers is the request for parnassah tovah - a good living. In the words of Rabbi Elazar ben Azaryah (Pirkei Avot: 4:21) - Em ein kemech ein Torah - "If there is no flour [no dough]. there is no Torah." And yet, there is a second half to the quote: "If there is no Torah, there is no flour."

High Holydays is a time for Torah, a time to gain perspective. Perspective does not solve all of our problems, but it does allow us to appreciate what we have and to look forward with renewed strength. During this time of year, we wish each

other L'shanah tovah, May it be a good new year. The Hebrew root for the word "year" is also found in the word for "change." We are therefore also wishing each other, May it be a good change.

With the sound of the Shofar, we are called to awake, to see new possibilities. In the Torah reading of first day Rosh Hashanah, Hagar is desperate for water in the desert. The text says, "Her eyes were opened and she saw a well" (Genesis 21:19). The miracle was not the well, but her ability to suddenly see what was already before her.

Kurt Vonnegut in A Man Without a Country (p.132) describes an uncle whose chief complaint about people was that they did not appreciate what they already had. The uncle would regularly pause and exclaim, "If this isn't nice, I don't know what is." Vonnegut writes that he has continued to do the same and so have his sons.

As we reflect during these Days of Awe, may we remind ourselves of our blessings, and find the courage to make changes that renew and strengthen our bonds with our family, friends, our community, and the Divine. May our economy gain traction, for finances do weigh heavily upon us. May we reach out to friends and let them know of their personal worth to us. And may we know that pausing to appreciate what we have is the underpinning of a life well lived. On behalf of my family and myself, let me wish you a Shanah Tovah. \$\Phi\$

BEE PART OF THE HIVE

Thy do we dip apples into honey as our symbolic gesture of hope for a sweet new year? Why not dip orange slices into chocolate syrup – the perfect sabra treat - or pears into maple syrup? Before reading on, try to answer this question yourself. I will give you one hint-no matter what reason you come up with, you are correct. In Jewish discourse, every opinion has a place at the table.

Let's return to preindustrial Europe - say Polish farmland in the 1840s. Apples become obvious – they are a hearty fall fruit with multiple varieties that grow well and in abundance in Western, Central and Eastern Europe. While the luscious pear may also find a seasonal home in cold climates, perhaps pears were not as plentiful or robust and, yes, they had no bananas. Why honey? It is readymade by the bees. Tapping trees for maple syrup requires time and several stages of preparation before it can be consumed. Hersheys did not have wide distribution in the markets outside of Warsaw or Bialastok. The great thing about unprocessed honey is that bees do the lion's share of the work and these hard-working manufacturers are very efficient and flexible about where they set up shop. The hive and honeycomb are one of creation's stunning achievements.

Do apples and honey have anything to teach us about selfscrutiny and forgiveness? Again, try to answer this question on your own before reading on... A lovely image

once shared with me by a colleague is that the honey produced in any given hive is made by scores of bees drawing nectar from countless flowers. It is a communal effort if ever there was one. When Jews gather to worship and reflect on the Days of Awe, our prayers and petitions are all written in first person plural:

AvinNU MalkeiNU, kawtveiNU b'sefer geualah vishuah-OUR parent OUR sovereign, inscribe US in the book of deliverance...

AshamNU, BagadNU, GazalNU -WE abuse, WE betray, WE are cruel...

Al chate shechataNU l'fanekha b'owness u'v'ratzone, v'al chate shechataNU l'fanekha bivli da'at -WE have sinned against You unwillingly and willingly, and WE have sinned against You by misusing our minds...

Judaism praises daily a God who listens to and hears the prayers of all individuals every moment of every day. The focus of our Yamim Noraim (Days of Awe) is something much more far-reaching, richer and essentially communal. Jews world over become bees. When each of us visits all of our flowers - doing our part to repair damage we have done in the past year(s) to others in our own families, our own communities and to ourselves - and if we do our best to recognize the ways that we have dismissed the holy aspects of our lives in exchange for selfish pursuits, then, when we come together at this most awesome time, our communal contrition is the "honey" that allows us to realize the deep happiness that comes with true cleansing.

The hardest working bee cannot make anything without his or her posse. In kind, the potential goodness we as a Jewish community have the power to create through communal prayer and worship at this special time of year defies description if we are all willing to bring our "nectar" to the synagogue.

CALLED TO SERVE

You are not obliged to finish the task, neither are you free to neglect it. (Pirkei Avot 11:21)

s I write this, I am sitting at the courthouse in Santa Ana, wondering if I'll be called to perform my civic duty as a juror. While many of us loathe receiving that summons in the mail. I am reminded how fortunate we are as Americans to be able to participate in our judicial system. It feels like a huge inconvenience, but yet, imagine how you would feel if we did not have this system. Or worse, imagine how you would feel if we were excluded because we are Jews. Throughout history, Jews were often excluded from various professions and civic duties. We are truly blessed to live in America at this time in history!

I believe very strongly that Jewish children should learn and understand our Jewish history. It will be an important part of our curriculum this coming year. They will learn about the significant events that formulated our theology, gave us reason to celebrate, and determined where we would live in the world. They will get to know the names of Jewish heroes who saved our people, wrote our great books, stood up for what they believed in, and taught us how to be good Jews and good citizens. Our children will

learn how and why we pray, how and why we celebrate holidays, and the foundations of Hebrew language.

To accomplish this, I have been working with our faculty and planning with our Rabbi and Cantor an exciting year ahead. The faculty, new and returning, are excited about the curriculum materials and are already working on their lesson plans. We will be including art, drama, storytelling, and music in all of our classrooms. It is my goal that every child will enjoy coming to religious school to learn, to be with their friends, and to grow in appreciation of how special it is to be Jewish.

To truly make all of this happen, we need not only great teachers and lesson plans, but involved parents who are equally excited about your children's Jewish education. We will be having a variety of family class experiences and events throughout the year that I hope you will all attend. We are especially excited about the Shul-In event on November 18-19. This musical Shabbaton event will be great fun for the whole family and I promise it will be spiritually uplifting as well!

While I sit here in the jury waiting room, I notice that the room is full of people of all races and religions, all

prepared to do whatever is necessary to fulfill this important responsibility. I had a similar experience last week when I attended a meeting with some of our CBI teens at an Interfaith Youth Forum event. Teens of all religions gathered for a meal, played some ping-pong, and began their planning process for the next year's activities. I was very proud of the way the teens interacted and participated. They are doing such important work and breaking ground in interfaith relationships.

As it happens, I was dismissed from jury duty without being called to serve on a jury. But the experience reaffirms for me that the system is working and that people will rise to the occasion when they are called. So, having completed my civic responsibility, I am back to work planning for our school year. I believe this is my true calling and I am proud to serve the Jewish community at CBI! I am looking forward to meeting all of the children and creating a solid Judaica and Hebrew program that we can all be proud of. \$\Phi\$

ewish holidays are upon us. Celebrating Rosh Hashana with the children is a perfect holiday for the beginning of the school year. Jewish framework, in which to study, begins with how we have grown, to reflect on where we've been and where we'll be going together this year.

The preschool teachers at the CDC use reflection as a way of creating an enhanced atmosphere for the children in their classrooms. As Sonya Shoptaugh states, "Reflective teaching is based on questioning what we're doing and why, on listening to children, on thinking about how theory is translated into practice and how practice informs theory, is to enter into a way of working where professional development takes place day after day in the classroom." We have met several times this past year and will continue to meet as a group, focusing on study in ourselves and in the classrooms. As we learn to work together, we have learned to trust each other as partners, which helps us work as a team and create a school for active learners

We are taught that the sounds of the *shofar* are to wake us up, to direct us to pay attention to the kind of person we are and to help us become better teachers, people, parents and friends.

Although Rosh Hashana is a serious holiday, you can provide fun

things for children to do. While at home with your children during the High Holiday Celebration, pull out old family photos and look at how the people have changed, point out to your child their baby pictures, how they have changed and grown. Tell stories about how you celebrated the holidays when you were a child, how your grandparents celebrated. Explain to your child how we send good wishes for the New Year. Call or send cards to your family and friends.

Celebrating Tashlich is another great way of talking to children about apologizing to all the people you may have hurt in the past year. Of course, don't forget, as a parent, to apologize to your child as well. L'Shana Tovah!

They loved and supported me and were at my side for a life-changing "moment".

Not a minute in the day goes by that I don't miss my dad or think about him. I don't really know exactly how I go on without his love, guidance and encouragement, other than to try and live my life the way he taught me to. Stay close to G-d, work hard at your job and for the Jewish community, love your family, face your challenges and be a good person. I have no choice but to move forward without my dad but he is always with me through his lessons and love.

It is through CBI that I am getting stronger. Camp and those little faces did help in the healing process by keeping me busy and active. The hugs and smiles help the most. I am looking forward to another busy, fun and successful program year. I am looking forward to the arrival of another grandchild and enjoying all 3 of them. I am looking forward to keeping my dad's memory alive by sharing the lessons and the superstitions he taught to me with

all of you. My dad always reminded me to step out of the house on the right foot, then all would go right for in your day. I urge you to carry on "the Herb-ism" by doing the same when you leave your home each day. It is also my hope that many of your days include the CBI Youth Department. Our groups include: Machar (grades K-3) Kadima (grades 4-6) and USY (grades 7-12). All events include lifechanging "moments" and memories to be cherished.



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


